**Subject: Support for Enhanced Accessibility Modification Program** 

Dear Members of the Toronto Community Housing Board of Directors,

I am writing to express support for the evaluation and potential implementation of an **enhanced accessibility modification program** as outlined in **Item 11C**: **City Council Directions Requiring Board Attention**, specifically related to the directives under **PH15.6** - **Increasing the City's Supply of Accessible Affordable Housing**.

The directive to incorporate enhanced accessibility modifications into the turnover renovation program offers a strategic opportunity to gradually increase the number of accessible units across the TCHC portfolio. As part of this evaluation, we encourage the Board to consider:

- Leveraging existing partnerships with accessibility advocates and organizations.
- Identifying cost-effective solutions and technologies to enhance accessibility features.
- Ensuring that renovations align with current best practices and universal design standards.

#### 2. Engage a Broad Range of Stakeholders

In addition to consulting with **R-PATH**, we strongly recommend involving local residents' associations such as the Regent Park Neighbourhood Association, FoSTRA, and FoNTRA. These organizations represent diverse community perspectives and can provide valuable

insights into tenant needs and priorities. Such an inclusive approach will help ensure that the proposed program reflects the realities of the communities it aims to serve.

# 3. Incorporate Findings into Budget Processes

The financial implications of this initiative should be integrated into future budget cycles to secure the necessary resources for implementation. Transparency in the reporting process will help ensure accountability and alignment with City Council's broader objectives for social housing.

#### Conclusion

Enhancing the accessibility of TCHC's housing stock is a vital step toward creating inclusive communities that meet the diverse needs of Toronto residents. By advancing this initiative, the Board will be addressing a pressing need while fulfilling the City's commitment to equity and accessibility.
